According to the author, Brainwashed is designed to rip off the lid of a system that has for too long asserted diplomatic immunity while feeding students a steady diet of levism (p. xviii). Under the poorly written content of the book, much of which seems to be a personal vendetta against UCLA professor Robert Watson, is a devout hatred of higher education that symbolizes the arguments of neoconservative ones such as Dinesh D'Souza, Diana Ravich and David Horowitz. A recent graduate of the University of California, Los Angeles, 20-year-old Ben Shapiro is a nationally syndicated columnist for Creators Syndicate, an international distributor of features for newspapers and websites. He is perhaps best known for his conservative and controversial columns at UCLA's Daily Bruin and the social knowledge surrounding his dismissal from the newspaper, the focus of Chapter 11. Shapiro's central thesis is that the academy is overwhelmingly made up of people who are anti-Republican, anti-Israel and anti-American, anti-capitalism, religion, war and God, being pro-democrats, pro-Islams and pro-Islams, in favor of socialism and communism, affirmative action and multiculturalism, homosexuality, abortion, euthanasia, radical environmentalism and moral retivism. Despite the title of the book, the text is often more an indictment of social policy and liberal ideology than an attack on higher education. Shapiro organizes a discussion of these topics in 12 chapters and concludes his presentation of recommendations to conservatives in a brief (six-page) chapter entitled Solutions. Criticism of his arguments is justified, at least in part, by the fervor underlying his categorization of a typical American teacher. The book has serious methodological limitations, as the author consistently does not provide incomplete or biased support for his claims. To document the ways in which the academy brainwashed students, Shapiro relies on a single sentence quote from faculty without providing any additional information, including to what extent one faculty's opinion was representative of all faculties, whether the statement was related to the Faculty of Knowledge, whether based on any research, or whether it was an educational for indoctrination. Shapiro also inappropriately summarizes from his experience at UCLA in all students at all educational institutions. When it is included, the sources supporting his point of view are drawn from conservative organizations, talk radio and online reactionary media. The irony in Shapiro's speech is that while his final recommendation to students is Please think for yourself (p. 182), his own conservative brainwashing is little different from the left-wing version he so strongly opposes. It is tempting to criticize the book by line, not only because of methodological deficiencies, but also because of the prevalence of inflammatory language. Two of the most outrageous examples: Many professors justify and even encourage paedophilia (p. 62) and Professors are willing to go out on limbs to kill babies (p. 95). We stopped counting how many times he used the word idiot. The overall style and structure of the argument can be illustrated in a representative example. In Chapter 2, Guerrilla Politics, Shapiro summarizes the opposition to legislation that he promotes, the Welfare Reform Act of 1996, by stating that professors advocate for a big, expensive, useless form of welfare that keeps adolescent pregnancy high, labor ethics low, and upper class paying massive taxes (p. 13). He then quotes Professor Shelia Kamerman of Columbia University: There is a fantasy that these changes will significantly reduce out-of-marriage childbirth and teenage pregnancy. But very little attention is paid to the consequences for children (p. 13). Shapiro makes no mention of Dr. Camerman being a century-old professor of social work at the Compton Foundation and a nationally and international expert on child and family policy. Nor does he criticize the basis of her statement, but trivializes it: Camerman knows the trick: When you have no reason to make a real argument, cry...
